I'm pleased to report that the Library Trustees, Staff, and I have been hard at work this Spring, working to improve library services and

planning for the future. Here are the two projects we're most eager to share with you:


Expanded Hours

You asked, and we listened! The top two requests in our most recent survey were for increased hours and improved collections. We're pleased to announce that the Library will be increasing our operating hours by 19% this Spring.

Starting Monday, June 5, our new hours will be:

Monday-Thursday 9am-7pm Friday-Saturday 9am-5pm

These changes will not require an increase in the budget. There is much more we'd like to do in the future, including improving our collections and further expanding our hours, but these improvements will require additional funding. In the meantime, we hope the new hours will make it easier for you to visit the Library as a regular part of your week.



Library Renewal Project

Prior to my arrival last September, the Library Trustees and Staff embarked on Phase II of a longterm library renewal project to reevaluate and reimagine Library facilities and services for the future.

In this phase, expected to conclude this Fall, we are working to identify how our facility and use of Library space can be redesigned to align with our new vision and to better serve the community. To help facilitate this process, we have hired Lerner, Ladds, and Bartels (LLB Architects) to develop a conceptual design of what our renewed library can be.

As we develop design options we will be asking many questions. For example:

- Does our current allocation of space reflect our service priorities and needs?
- Is there opportunity to increase the amount of space available to the public?

- ⇔ Can a new design allow us to provide new and better services?
- ⇔ Does our use of space promote staff efficiency and productivity?
- ⇔ Can a new design make it easier for our patrons to access and explore Library materials?
- How can we make the space warmer and more inviting to our patrons?
- Solution Can be the Library's long-term sustainability?
- How might the design highlight the historic character of the building and further contribute to the beauty and appeal of the Lyme Street district?

Introducting Young Adult Librarian Nike Desis

Young Adult Librarian Nike Desis grew up in Rye, NY, and graduated from Kenyon College in Ohio. After several years of travel, including a stint in Philadelphia where she was a founding member of the FLUXspace art collective, she settled in New London and worked on Young Adult programming at the New London Public Library.

Nike joined the Old Lyme-Phoebe Griffin Noyes Library staff in October 2016 and has been running some very dynamic programs including a Graphic Novel Book Club, and an Anime Club which explores Japanese-style animation and culture. Activities have included make your own sushi, emoji magnets, and carved stamps.

She says, "Young Adults are such a great audience. They are open to so many things, but are also self-directed."

The Demigod Duelers Book Club, based on the Percy Jackson series, has been especially popular with the Middle School age group. The "Duelers" chose whether they wanted to represent the Roman "Camp Jupiter" or the Greek "Camp Half-Blood", then Nike

taught them how to screenprint their own T-shirts for each camp. Volunteers Brianna (8th Grade) and Ryan (12th Grade) were on hand to assist with these activities. In later sessions, the kids made puppets and discussed themes from the novels.

Nike says, "The Library is an educational and creative space that is different than a classroom, for example. I hope it's a place where they can have some freedom to stretch, delve into the things that interest them, and to try out new







Nike often draws on her art experience to create innovative YA programming. She is an active member of SPARK Makerspace in New London. SPARK's resources and community are dedicated to providing low-cost and no-cost learning opportunities which build resourcefulness and confidence, with an emphasis on giving and receiving support. It's not just about making things, but also making things happen.

Asked how she sees the Library's role in the lives of young adults,

ideas. I want them to have fun, and to explore in a creative way."

Upcoming events for Young Adults include the start of the Summer Reading Program; a three-session Cyanotype art course with Aly Maderson-Quinlog; and the possibility of having the kids build a 3D Printer and other engineering projects. Based on feedback from the "Demigod Duelers", there is also strong interest in a Harry Potter-themed book club next Fall.

From the President: Being a Trustee

Old Lyme has a robust public life, where people readily offer their ideas and energy to serve the community. I and my colleagues serve our community as OL-PGN Trustees—but what exactly is the role of a Trustee? Is there special expertise required to be one?

No special expertise is required to be a Trustee—we come from many backgrounds and are not library experts—but we do commit the time and energy to help us achieve our ambitious goals. As Trustees we take on many responsibilities:

- We advocate for the Library by pursuing opportunities to meet and speak with community groups and town leaders and by bringing a knowledge of the community's needs and interests to inform board decisions.
- We manage and gain approval of the annual budget and select auditors for our financial records.
- We seek out opportunities to strengthen our endowment and earn grants to support our vision, while also working to maintain town financial support.

- We plan for the future of the Library by developing long-range objectives and plans for the growth and development of the Library.
- We review the overall effectiveness of the Library to ensure the community is satisfied with Library services and the Library is meeting its goals.
- ⇔ We establish limited policies concerning issues such as financial investments, facilities, and staffing.
- ⇔ We appoint a Library Director to manage day-today operations and evaluate the Director to ensure the Library operates in the best interest of our community.

We meet monthly (usually the 2nd Tuesday, in the evening) and various board committees also meet according to their own schedules. I enjoy working with the wonderful people on the Board and we have fun at our meetings. We have a lot going on, and the Library's future looks very bright!
